Film Appreciation

• It's important to understand what makes great cinema, great. And so, we start with screening of great films and understanding and analyzing them.

Film Genres

• A story can be told in multiple ways, and historically there have been a few patterns that most filmmakers follow. We learn about them in film genres.

<u>Screenwriting Jargons</u>

• Before starting to write the screenplay, we need to understand the terms that constitute a screenplay.

Essential Building Blocks of Story

• Storytelling has some essential aspects, and those will be covered in this section.

The Structure Spectrum

• The flow of the story depends on the structure and a screenwriter must know how to play with that. A story well told has the ability to connect with a wider audience just because it's told in a different way.

Structure and Setting

• In this section we will cover how structure is dependent on the world in which the story is set in.

Genre and Character

• Structure also depends on the genre in which the film is being made in, and the attributes of the characters that embody that story. In this section we cover these two aspects.

Structure and Meaning

• What you want to say through your story has a profound effect on the structure of your story and vice versa. This section explores that.

Substance of a Story

• What makes some stories stand out from the rest? We explore the deeper levels on which stories connect with the audiences.

<u>The Inciting Incident</u>

• The point at which the film starts moving in a specific direction, which gives the character a goal to strive for.

Scene Design

• The rules of what makes a scene great will be explored in this section.

Scene Analysis

• After a scene is written, it needs to be analyzed and rewritten. As they say, all writing is rewriting.

Composition

• Composing is the art of placing the scenes in a way that create meaning out of them.

Crisis, Climax and Resolution

• The end is the hero and a film isn't great until it has a great climax. Even after the narrative has ended, the loose threads need to be tied, that is resolution.

Screenwriting Softwares

• We explore various screenwriting softwares, from industry standard Final Draft to economical softwares like Celtx.

Final Screenplay Feedbacks

• The students will have to write a short film screenplay and get it approved from the faculty to be shot when the cinematography section starts.
